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

Proper Paragraphs

Paragraphs Need Focus

The topic sentence tells you what the paragraph is about. Every sentence in the paragraph should clearly relate to the topic sentence.



Paragraphs Need Topic Sentences

The topic sentence (also called opening sentence) tells what the paragraph will be about. All sentences in the paragraph must support the topic sentence.

Paragraphs Need Concluding Sentences

The concluding sentence (also called closing sentence) sums up what the paragraph is about. It often repeats the idea in the topic sentence, but in different words.

Paragraphs Need Organization

Make sure you can recognize breaks in a paragraph's organization and know how to correct them.

Capital Letters

- At the beginning of sentences
 Do not get lazy on the test. do your best.
- At the beginning of a speech
 Suddenly my mom asked, "Where have you been?"
- For proper nouns (names, cities, titles)
 Eastview, Mr. Bean, Toronto
- With the personal pronoun 'I'

Quotation Marks

- Around all words in a direct quotation
- "We worked hard to save the money," said one traveler, "and the trip was well worth it."
- If a question mark belongs to the <u>quote</u>, place it inside, if it belongs to the <u>sentence</u>, place it outside
 - Fredrico asked, "Why are you always late?" Didn't you hear him say, "I'm in trouble"?
- To set off titles of short stories or poems
 Marjorie Pickthall wrote "Stars."
